## Reflection on All Saints Day

### Why honour the saints?

This is an important question that many exploring Anglicanism ask, especially those peering into this tradition from the standpoint of “non-Catholic” Christianity.

The talk of “saints” quickly strikes a nerve as it conjures up Roman Catholic devotions: prayers to saints, veneration of relics, and the constant observation of saint days. This “cult of the saints” was at its zenith during the late Middle Ages, and so it became a casualty as the Reformation sought to purify the Church. The result is that most Protestant and Evangelical churches don’t mention the saints. They fear that labelling someone as “St. so-and-so” sets them up on a holy pedestal and creates a “class distinction” among the Body of Christ.

Anglicanism’s response to the medieval situation and the modern practice among Evangelicalism is both “yes and no.”

Anglicans agree with Luther’s critique of Rome’s outlandish devotions. It is notable that when Thomas Cranmer wrote the Book of Common Prayer, he didn’t include a single prayer to a saint, and no BCP has included one since.

But Anglicans don’t go so far as to ignore the long history of the Church regarding saints and their veneration. The BCP has always included assigned readings and prayers (to God) for particular saint days. Cranmer wanted the saints and their veneration to play an important role in our devotion to God. Why?

Honouring the saints honours the One who makes them holy.

The saints (“Holy Ones”) are those “knit together” in Christ’s “mystical Body,” the Church. This is a gift given to us from our gracious God. We become a saint when we are baptized into Christ. His holiness sets us apart and makes us holy as well.

His holiness is not static, though. It is alive and active. It is the Holy Spirit, whose job it is to transform us and conform us to the image of Christ. A saint, then, is someone on the journey of becoming by grace what God is by nature: holy and perfect.

I think Evangelicals would agree with this: every Christian is a saint and will become like Christ when he returns.

Anglicanism pushes even further. While agreeing that everyone who is baptized and believes is a saint, we also recognize that there are those in whom the image and holiness of Christ is abundantly manifested. These we boldly label as “St. so-and-so.”

I say “boldly,” because calling someone a saint in this regard is more than an honorary title—it is a powerful proclamation about God’s ability to take someone “dead in their sins” (Eph. 2:1) and make them alive in Christ.

In other words, to venerate a saint and observe his or her feast day is nothing more than to venerate the all-surpassing power of Christ himself.

This is why we observe the feast days of saints and a day like All Saints. It reminds us of our own “sainthood” given to us in baptism. It calls to mind Christ’s work among our brothers and sisters departed this life in holiness. And it even serves as an invitation to us to “go and do likewise.”

As the collect for All Saints’ Day puts it, we remember the saints and pray that God will grant us “grace so to follow your blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living”. By grace alone the saints have embodied divine love, so much so that we can hold them up as role models for discipleship. Their life and witness calls us to continue progressing along the path of perfection in Christ.

If we do this, we too might be remembered as “St. so-and-so.”

## One of the Patron Saints of Farmers: - Saint Andrew

**Saint Andrew the Apostle**

**Also known as Andrew the Protoclete**

**Memorial** 30 November 9 May (translation of relics) 13 December (Ukraine)

### Profile

The first Apostle. Fisherman by trade. Brother of Simon Peter. Follower of John the Baptist. Andrew went through life leading people to Jesus, both before and after the Crucifixion. Missionary in Asia Minor and Greece, and possibly areas in modern Russia and Poland. Martyred on a saltire (x-shaped) cross, he is said to have preached for two days from it.

Some peculiar marriage-related superstitions have attached themselves to Saint Andrew’s feast day.

An old German tradition says that single women who wish to marry should ask for Saint Andrew’s help on the eve of his feast, then sleep naked that night; they will see their future husbands in their dreams.

Another says that young women should note the location of barking dogs on Saint Andrew’s Eve: their future husbands will come from that direction.

On the day after Andrew’s feast, young people float cups in a tub; if a boy’s and a girl’s cup drift together and are intercepted by a cup inscribed “priest”, it indicates marriage.

There are several explanations for why Andrew became **the patron of Scotland**.

In 345, Emperor Constantine the Great decided to translate Andrew’s bones from Patras, Greece to Constantinople. Saint Regulus of Scotland was instructed by an angel to take many of these relics to the far northwest. He was eventually told to stop on the Fife coast of Scotland, where he founded the settlement of Saint Andrew.

In the 7th century, Saint Wilfrid of York brought some of the saint’s relics with him after a pilgrimage to Rome, Italy. The Scots king, Angus MacFergus, installed them at Saint Andrew’s to enhance the prestige of the new diocese.

When the Pictish King Angus faced a large invading army, he prayed for guidance. A white cloud in the form of a saltire cross floated across the blue sky above him. Angus won a decisive victory, and decreed that Andrew would be the patron saint of his country. Following Robert Bruce’s victory at the Battle of Bannockburn in 1314, the Declaration of Arbroath officially named Saint Andrew the patron saint of Scotland. The Saltire became the national flag of Scotland in 1385.

*While this song itself was not released as a single, the album Tapestry as a whole is a record-breaking charting album. It was the #1 album in the US for fifteen consecutive weeks, being the longest run any female solo artist has ever had at the top of the album charts and has occupied a spot on the Billboard top-200 albums for a total of over 300 weeks. The album is certified diamond by the RIAA - that means over ten million sold.*

*While it is a love song rather than an inspirational song, the lyrics are inspired by the Biblical Book of Ruth. The relevant King James quote is found in the Old Testament Ruth 1:16: "whither thou goest, I will go..." The situation there is that Naomi has two sons who marry two women, Ruth and Oprah. The sons die and Naomi tells the daughters-in-law that she's releasing them to go back to their mothers and remarry; Ruth stays anyway and gives her famous loyalty speech while Oprah goes off to found her TV show... ha! No, not the same Oprah. This all happens in the middle of a deadly famine. Ruth reaps good karma for her loyalty by later marrying Boaz and having a son, and living a typical happily-ever-after ending. Incidentally, she also finds herself in the direct lineage of King David.*

Burne-Jones imagines the story of the Creation in the form of angels holding spheres that reveal each of the days of creation. Each window has a corresponding number of angels, three for the third day and

so on. The angels are giving us a message about the preciousness of our world. These windows are radiant and glorious with intense, jewel like reds, blues, greens, whites and golds. Many a happy hour has been spent by many in this beautiful chapel.
